

# Maynard-Pearson House Repairs

If you've been to the Maynard-Pearson House in the last few months you must have seen the condition of the back porch ceiling. Due to a water leak that had existed for an extended period of time a portion of the roof was rotted. Several roof boards, the rafters and the beam that supported the center of the roof were severely damaged. In the last few weeks, the problem had become so severe that the beam in the center of the roof seemed in imminent danger of collapsing.

We obtained a Certificate of Appropriateness from Capital Area Preservation which allowed us to proceed with repairs. After receiving quotes from several contractors, the job was given to Lee Williams of Leland Builders. Many of our members are familiar with Leland from the work they have previously done on several historic homes in the Apex area including the Maynard-Pearson House. Lee and his crew did an excellent job on the repairs which required removal of the metal roofing over the porch so the beam, rafters and roofing boards could be replaced.

It is interesting that the original roof rafters were split in the middle just above the beam in the center of the porch. This implies that the porch at one time may have been only half as deep as it currently is and that the rafters, roof and porch were extended at some time in the past. The new rafters installed by Lee Williams are the full length of the porch and the center beam was replaced to maintain the original appearance of the Maynard-Pearson House rather than because it is needed to support the roof.

Painting was not included in the repair work, so we are looking for volunteers to scrape and paint the porch.

We are now ready to move on to the next repair tasks that are needed and will be looking for quotations on a complete painting of the house, including needed repairs, scraping and all prep work.

# Grants

**W**e have applied for several grants this year. As many of you are aware, the availability of funds from donors has diminished significantly since the downturn in the economy. Additionally, there are very few organizations that are willing to donate money for actual physical preservation work such as the repairs and improvements needed for the Maynard-Pearson House.

This spring we applied for a grant from the Downtown Merchants Festival Commission. We requested funds to help us accomplish the transcription of oral history interviews as moving from the tape recordings to transcribed notes has been a bottleneck for us. We were granted \$300 by the Commission which can be used to pay a part-time transcriptionist or purchase equipment to help us accomplish these tasks.

This summer, we sent a letter of request to Mr. Jim Bambul, the store manager at the Beaver Creek Lowe's store for funds to perform repairs and maintenance on the Maynard-Pearson House including the back porch repairs and prep work and painting of the house. We found that local store managers are limited to small donations and that we would need to apply for funding from the Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation. In July we applied for a Lowe's Community Part-

ners Grant from the Foundation. We had assistance from David Rowland, Mr. Bambul, and a letter of support from Mayor Keith Weatherly. Unfortunately, we learned in September that we would not receive any funding from Lowe's.

We also applied for a Community Impact Grant from the Home Depot Foundation in July. The request was again for funding for repairs to the Maynard-Pearson House. We have also learned that we would not receive funding from this Foundation either.

We learned about the Marion Stedman Covington Foundation in Greensboro from the Federation of North Carolina Historical Societies. The Federation described the Covington Foundation as one of just a few foundations to focus on historic preservation. Their preference is to provide challenge grants or seed support, but they have previously provided funding for restoration work on historic structures. We applied for a grant from this foundation that would essentially cover the cost of the repairs to the back porch of the Maynard-Pearson House. We have been advised that the Covington Foundation will consider our request at their October meeting.
